

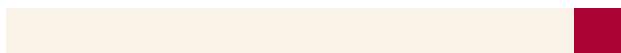

Specific designation of honors courses within the major will be as follows:

1. The student in SPA or FEE honors will designate three 3-hour upper-level courses as honors courses, and the student and professor will work together to ensure that the honors course is in-depth and meets the standard enrollment course will be SPA417 or FEE 417, the Special Studies course, which will be an intensive research course with a faculty member writing of the honors thesis.
2. The student in LANG honors will designate LANG 315, 325, 440, and 495 as honors-contracted courses.
3. The TESOL honors student will designate 315, 320, 410, and 440 as honors-contracted courses.
4. All honors students in the department present their honors thesis in lieu of the standard capstone presentation when they enroll in the required SPA/FEE/TESL/LANG490 course during their final semester.

Admission Requirements.

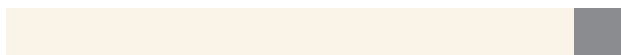
1. 3.5 minimum cumulative grade point average entry into DSH
2. Recommended academic preparation
3. The student should have at least 3 semesters of research experience. If students plan a fall or spring full-semester study abroad, they should plan to begin the DSH program. They may continue their thesis research, but the honors-designated

courses must be under the oversight by a Union faculty member

Progression:

1. The student must complete the honors course and adhere to the timeline for his/her program
2. The student must complete the required adjustment student will be dismissed from the honors track each semester

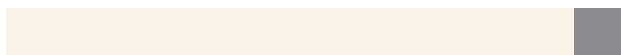
